Project Overview

Objectives

This is the fourth survey in the series commissioned by NUS, NUS Charity and TOTUM to understand more about how students feel about the current Coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic and the impacts they are experiencing. Previous surveys – phases 1, 2 and 3 - took place in March, July and November 2020 respectively.

Methodology

A sample of 5832 was achieved.

Respondents were given a chance to win £500 to encourage response.

The survey was promoted via the NUS Student database, the TOTUM database, and through NUS channels in March 2021.

The survey took around 20 minutes to complete and was in field from 8th March to 29th March 2021

What we look for

Within this report, a number of questions have been broken down by demographics, which have been compared with each other. Where applicable and the base size is large enough (n>50), statistically significant differences between demographics and their answers have been shown. A difference is significant when it is likely to have been caused by something other than random chance.

Sample weighting

Explanation of weighting

NUS achieved an original sample of **5892** students. The response rate reflected the trend that females participate more than males in completing surveys - the initial gender split was: 65% female and 27% male.


While this survey sampled both HE, FE and other learners, our practice is to reflect a student population where possible. In the absence of any national FE statistics, NUS practice is to use HESA. According to HESA statistics the gender split within Higher Education is 56% female and 45% male. In order to reflect this, 'weighting' was applied to the data in this report. In this case, we adjusted the profile of the sample by applying weights so that the over represented group, females, are down weighted and the under represented group, males, are up weighted. This resulted in a gender split in this survey of x% female and x% male and a sample of **5832.**

Accommodation



Students' living arrangements have stayed fairly consistent since November 2020. The largest proportions still live with parent(s)/guardian(s) or in their own home.



Weighted Base: 5345 respondents. Balance: no response

Over half of students live in the same place during term time and holidays. Of the almost two in five students who do have a different address in term time, around a third returned to their term time accommodation following the Christmas break.

New to Phase 4



Of the 2257 students (38% of those who took part in the survey) who do have a different term time address to their 'holiday' time accommodation:

32% returned to their term time accommodation

33% did not return to their term time accommodation

35% didn't leave over Christmas

Why not?

- Travel restrictions
- Vulnerable / shielding relatives




Weighted Base: 5244 respondents. Balance: no response / xx F2. Have you returned to your term time accommodation?

Of those who did return to their term time accommodation, over half did so because they had already paid for it. Just over a fifth did so because their house/flat mates were going back and they wanted to form a bubble with them.

Reasons for return to accommodation








For those who plan to be in rented accommodation in September around a third have already signed a contract.

Why



Feelings of safety are identical to November 2020; around two thirds of students continue to feel very or extremely safe in their accommodation.



Weighted Base: 5323 respondents. Balance: no response

Over two thirds of renters continue to have some level of concern about being able to pay their rent in the coming year, particularly those who don't know/are unsure if they are finishing their studies this year, international students, those from a BAME background and students with a disability.

Level of concern about financial impact of Coronavirus (Covid-19) on ability to pay rent







Weighted Base: 2387 respondents. Balance: those not living in privately rented accommodation or owned halls of residence

Around a fifth of students admit to having been unable to pay their rent in full over the past 4 months. And around a quarter admit they have been unable to pay their bills in full over the past 4 months. These figures are consistent with those reported in November 2020.












Key demographics (weighted base)








Full time: 64%











Does your gender identity match the gender you were assigned at birth?






Sexual orientation/preference






Disability, impairment or long term health condition


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


Marital status








Religion, faith or belief






