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Project Overview

Objectives

The key objectives of the survey were to understand what issues are important to students and what would influence them to vote for a specific political party or candidate at the General Election

What we look for

Within this report, a number of questions have been analysed by different demographic groups. Where applicable, and the base size is large enough (n>30), statistically significant differences between answers have been shown. A difference is significant when it is likely to have been caused by something other than random chance.

Methodology

A final weighted* sample of 1901 was achieved.

Chance to win one **cash prize** of £500 with 5 runner up prizes of £100 to encourage response.

The survey was promoted via the TOTUM **student database**.

The survey **took approximately 5 minutes** to complete.

*The data has been weighted so that it represents the HESA demographic profile with males representing 44% and female representing 56% of the base




Section 3: General Election – opportunities in Europe



Over 6 in 10 respondents (62%) were likely to support a political party or candidate who were willing to protect opportunities to study in Europe once the UK had left the European Union.

Significantly more likely amongst::


- Students aged 23-29

Those with a student loan are slightly more likely (44%) than those without (40%) to say they would be 'very likely' to support a political party or candidate who were willing to protect opportunities to study in Europe once the UK had left the European Union.


Likelihood to support party or candidate offering to protect your opportunities to study in Europe

Likelihood to support party or candidate offering to protect your opportunities to study in Europe



Students studying in Scotland (51%) and the North West (48%) are slightly more likely than those studying in other regions to say they would be 'very likely' to support a political party or candidate who were willing to protect opportunities to study in Europe once the UK had left the European Union.

Likelihood to support party or candidate offering to protect your opportunities to study in Europe












