# #StandByMe Partnership - Toolkit

## **Supporting Student Survivors**

The #StandByMe campaign Partnership Scheme aims to bring together Rape Crisis centres, universities, and colleges to improve support for survivors of sexual violence.

## Introduction

NUS Hidden Marks showed that 1/7 female university students have been a victim of serious sexual assault, but the quality of university reporting procedures and support processes are inconsistent and inadequate. The lack of clarity around the complaints and disciplinary procedures for victims of sexual harassment and assault on campuses is reflected in our Lad Culture audit report and our recent Lad Culture and sexism survey,

For much too long universities and colleges have offered very little in terms of support most of the time the help comes in the form of signposting students to local services which are often under-funded and inadequate. Students want to see their institutions invest in long term and emergency support for victims of sexual assault. #STANDBYME aims to bring together Rape Crisis centres, universities, and colleges to improve support for survivors of sexual assault and rape.

This toolkit aims to provide institutions, students' unions and rape crisis centres with more detailed overview on potential activities and outputs that your partnership could engage in, working towards providing accessible and high quality support services for survivors of sexual violence.

## **#StandByMe Partnership Scheme**

The #StandByMe campaign aims to improve reporting procedures as well as services available to support student survivors of sexual assault whilst at university or college. The Lad Culture Audit recommends that institutions and SUs should worked together to provide and promote the following:

- **Clear care pathways** accessible modes of reporting which is linked to a specialised support for victims of sexual harassment and assault.
- **Clear signposting** to local police stations, sexual health services, counselling and other services available for victims of sexual harassment and assault.
- **External Partnerships** seek to improve links with third party organisations which can provide support to victims.
- **Safe Spaces** implement safe spaces and support groups to improve the support services available to victims of sexual harassment and sexual violence.

The NUS #StandByMe Partnership scheme aims to bring together Rape Crisis centres, universities, and colleges to improve support for survivors of sexual assault / violence.

#### **Rape Crisis**

Rape Crisis England & Wales is the national umbrella body for a network of autonomous member Rape Crisis organisations across England and Wales and was set up to support their specialist work. They also raise awareness and understanding of sexual violence in the wider community and with local, regional and national government. Rape Crisis organisations are women-led and offer a range of specialist support, advocacy, counselling and information in a women-only safe space. Some also provide separate space and services for male sexual violence survivors. Rape Crisis Scotland (RCS) is the national office for the Rape Crisis movement in Scotland. They support the work of local centres and develop new centres in areas where there are no or few specialist services. Rape Crisis Network Ireland is the representative body for member Rape Crisis centres, the RCNI role includes the development and coordination of national projects.

The partnership scheme is divided up into four key trends.

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## **Case Studies**

## Care Pathways

#### **University College London Union**

We publicise information on support services on the Union website, and have got the university to include support information in their sexual violence guidance on the UCL website. As part of our Zero Tolerance campaign, we run anti-harassment workshops for UCLU staff, club & society committees, new UCL students at the start of the year, and soon for UCL staff - at every workshop, we discuss support options & give participants a list of support services available if they need to access support or refer someone else on (this is especially important for staff to know where to refer to for support, so students don't just get passed from one contact to another to another). The support services we advertise include external services like Rape Crisis & Survivors UK as well as services available within UCL.

#### University of Manchester Students' Union


We created a specific student support worker based in Manchester Rape Crisis. I set up a meeting with the counsellor and all of the heads of student counselling and advice services with the 3 local universities about how to refer and signpost to that service. The impact report shows that it's really working in terms of providing person centred specialist support and there are case studies showing how those people now feel more confident and safe in themselves to stay at university.

#### University of Sussex Students' Union

We've developed two care pathways, one for staff responding to an incident of sexual violence and one for staff responding to an incident of sexual violence on the weekends. 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## Training

#### Kings College London Students' Union

Worked with Rape Crisis (South London) to deliver training to University and Union staff, with the aim of understanding the impact of rape culture, recognizing harmful practices and approaches, and learning how to support survivors if they are disclosing to you. This training is also being delivered to the staff who Chair University Misconduct Committees, to help ensure that the committees dealing with misconduct relating to sexual violence have a clear understanding of rape culture, and the needs of survivors. Harassment Advisers, Students' Union caseworkers and University advisers have had training to ensure that they can provide appropriate support to survivors considering making a complaint, taking other action, or dealing with the impact of sexual violence.

#### **University College London Union**

We have organised several training sessions with Rape Crisis covering what sexual violence is, how to support those who have experienced it, and also the law & how CPS works in cases of sexual violence. This training is now part of the sabb induction process (for WO & welfare sabbs), and have offered it to our Rights & Advice staff as well as UCL staff in student support & wellbeing, psychological services, student disability services, and to our halls wardens. Prior to this, no counsellors at psychological services had received any training on dealing with students who have experienced sexual violence. Rape Crisis training is now in the job description for halls wardens and by next academic year, all wardens will have had to do the training.

We have seen a marked improvement in the approach of student support & wellbeing since they have been trained - and have now agreed to hire an ISVA to work with them part time from September 2016. They have also established a partnership with Camden Safety Net, a council service that offers counselling & support to all those who work, live, or study in Camden and have experienced sexual or domestic violence (this means all UCL students are able to use the service). Rape Crisis have also provided us with a written briefing about receiving disclosure and supporting survivors, which we use and refer to in all of our staff training.

## Fundraising

#### University of Manchester Students' Union

The student support worker based in Manchester Rape Crisis funded by the fundraising the women's campaign has done (donations and t shirt sales at reclaim the night and ticket sales from the vagina monologues) and also the fares from the student shuttle bus that I set up this year which takes students from campus to their door during the night for cheap. We've really pushed the local services and also campaigned and raised awareness about the cuts to local and national women's services whilst also fundraising for them.

Those three things have worked really well doing them at the same time. We've raised about  $\pounds$ 7,000 this year for the student support worker at Manchester Rape Crisis as a result of it.

## Campaigning

#### University College London Union

As part of our Zero Tolerance campaign we have talked about support services and are moving our focus toward pushing for improved support on campus. I have used our fundraising to raise awareness of the funding crisis for sexual violence services.

We ask for donations at big, open to everyone events - our feminist club nights, panel discussions, 'zine launches, etc. I've used these opportunities to raise awareness of the funding crisis for sexual violence services, which I feel has been positive as so many people are unaware - and we've raised a fair bit of money (must be over £100 in total during my year) for the Rape Crisis Helpline.

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## Memorandum of Understanding – template

#### 1. Rationale/Scope

- c. Engaging in fundraising activities to ensure Rape Crisis centres and their partner institutions are appropriately funded to deliver support services and information on sexual assault and rape for students.
- d. Working in partnership to create support pathways for student survivors of rape and sexual assault.

#### 3. Description of the Partner Agencies

Rape Crisis England & Wales is the national umbrella body for a network of autonomous member Rape Crisis organisations across England and Wales and was set up to support their specialist work. Rape Crisis organisations are women-led and offer a range of specialist support, advocacy, counselling and information in a women-only safe space. Some also provide separate space and services for male sexual violence survivors and/or for men who are supporting a survivor. They also raise awareness and understanding of sexual violence in the wider community and with local, regional and national government.

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#### 4. Confidentiality

Rape Crisis centre name and College/University/SU affirm the importance of providing students with options for confidential services and support. All services provided by *Rape Crisis centre* name to students and College/University/SU will be kept confidential except in the following circumstances:

- a. If the student or employee wants information shared with College or campus security, campus or local law enforcement, *Rape Crisis centre* will obtain informed consent for release of the information. When releases of information are required, they will be written, informed, and reasonably time-limited.
- b. *Rape Crisis centre* will provide College aggregate data about incidents of sexual violence and other reportable offences to help the College identify patterns or systemic problems related to sexual violence. *Rape Crisis centre* and the College/University/SU will consult with victims regarding what information needs to be withheld to protect their identity.
- C. If the law requires disclosure as a result of safeguarding issues or an imminent terrorist threat'

#### 5. Governance structure and reporting
